The Bell Tower had been a dream of mine ever since Randy LaFoy brought the old cast iron bell out of the mothballs for our first Common Table Potluck in 2008. It took ten years to gain traction, but with the help of Dave and Lead Carpenter Gene Ruehle, the project took shape and came to fruition just in time for primary voters to see its rough skeleton. Since then the final bell placement and landscaping was completed in time for Dave to earn his eagle award before his 18th birthday.

Engineer Bill Becklin volunteered his design skills for the worthy cause as did Andy Sorenson who was the contractor. City Building Inspector Jack Kramer, City Engineer Steve Thatcher, John Lund, and Doug Danks also rendered professional help.

We are very fortunate that Dave undertook this project and gave us a new landmark and identity while preserving history.

If you would like to contribute to this piece of history, the city is still collecting donations. A dedication and appreciation event will be held as well for our residents to come celebrate Dave's achievement and recognize contribution our community.
