#### **CITY NEWS BITS:**

- A Traffic Calming Task Force has been created to look into ways to reduce speed along Wildwood Avenue. Contact city hall if you are interested in serving. The city is also looking for ways to reduce cut-through traffic which seems to have been abated with the recent road construction on our eastern border. Stay tuned.
- Deer management returns this fall. Due to the ongoing concerns with our over-abundant deer herd, the Midwest Bow Hunters Association will again schedule two hunts. Look to the city Website or sign up for emails for further announcements.
- COVID \$--The city received \$66,000 to help address issues with the pandemic. The council is working on bids to install a radio tower to collect water meter reading data. This will negate the need to have people monitoring meters. It will also address the problem of our meter reading provider phasing out their service.
- More COVID \$--The city is pursuing the installation of a generator at the Dellwood Lift Station. This will protect residents in the area from dangerous sewage back-ups—which was brought to light with the recent power line failure there this summer.
- Credit card payments are NOW ACCEPTED for permits, licenses & misc. fees.
- Check city hall lost and found if you've lost anything.
- Please remove your kayak/canoe from the city racks by Oct. 31 to avoid penalties.

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- The city had Kay Beach surveyed to address the concerns about the property line on the south side of the easement. The homeowner's survey and the city's both confirmed that the city has more land than people knew. Markers have been put up by the property owner to delineate their space. Please respect their markers.
- Also at Kay Beach, with the increase use by everyone staying home, the bushes have been used as a potty.
  To help ameliorate the situation, the bushes (box elder, ash and other scrub) have been removed.
  Please use the biffy by the hockey hut.
- Diseased Tree monitoring. The city is again sending out a tree inspector to identify oak wilt, Dutch elm disease and emerald ash borer. The inspector will only observe trees from public rights-of-way unless you request an on-site review. Please contact the city administrator to assist with such a request.
- Lake Links. The city council has appointed Council member Jon Fleck to aid in the discussions about the trail's one-way direction along South Shore Blvd. The final resolution could adversely impact the safety of residents on Birchwood Lane. We will also be reviewing and advocating against any possibility of potential cut-through traffic either via Wildwood Avenue or Cedar Street. This will be a long process. Stay tuned.
- City Council Salaries: After many years of the same salary rate, the council is increasing the amounts from \$1500 for mayor and \$600 for council members to \$2500/\$1500. These rates are commensurate with our neighboring communities. More importantly, the service these officials provide is often time-consuming and difficult. The council felt the raises were long-overdue.
- 2021 City budget. Under construction at the time of this newsletter. FFI, please sign up on email notice list.
- 2040 Comprehensive Plan. After years of study, our plan is now complete and being sent to area government agencies for comment. It is available on line. Please see city website for more info.

In late July, I was invited to a tour of the new Wildwood Library. It is a very impressive building compared to when it used to be housed in the old Willernie Bakery. The original library was started by two very dedicated public servants: Mrs. Garin and Mrs. Holly. They felt that our area deserved to have a space for kids and adults to congregate and learn over the love of books. That library bonded our small area communities together. Over the years it grew and re-invented itself. (I especially enjoyed the recent, communal jigsaw puzzle—pre-covic of course).

As we toured the new facility, I couldn't help but think of Marlyce Lee, our last "long-time" librarian. I am sure she would deny it, but she was one who made our local library one in which we all felt special. I remember more than once that I would find a book on reserve for me that I did not request.
