WATER RATE INFO:

You have heard much about excessive water use in the media these days. We took a look at our use and found that Birchwood is doing its part to reduce waste! Ten years ago all residents used an average of 55,000,000 cubic feet per year. In the past two years we have averaged 33,000,000 cu. ft. That is a 40% decrease!

But we still have issues. We don't have a water tower in town (or at least one that is functioning), so our city buys water from the City of White Bear Lake. We charge residents the cost for that water, plus an added cost to cover operating expenses. Most of our costs are fixed. When we have an extreme winter like last year with many water main breaks (4), we can't cover our costs. Last year was kind of a perfect storm of extra costs—we had a wet summer, used less water, and we had some very expensive breaks.

For the past year, the city water task force has been tackling the way the city charges for water use to make sure we have enough revenue, even in wet years. We have been operating at a deficit in our water fund for the past year. In addition, we have been told to expect at least a 10% increase by White Bear Lake due to the cost of their fees in defending the lake level lawsuit.

Unfortunately, that means your cost is going up as well. The good news is the city has pared its operating costs by \$8-10,000 per year by contracting locally for its water operator (which we are required by law to have). We also will be instituting a fee structure that conforms with our neighboring communities that will include larger fees for larger water users. With all of these measures in place, we hope to have a stable water fund. Exact rate fees will be decided by the council this summer.

Of course, this issue will not go away. We will be visiting this again as the legislature decides if and when we have to start drawing water from the Mississippi.

SPRING LEAF PICK UP

The city will again provide for spring leaf pick up. Based on comments and the amount of leaves picked up last year, a flat fee of \$25 will be charged (via your utility bill) to each resident who puts leaves out at the curb. Since the contractor makes many swings through town, **if you use the service multiple times, you will be billed for each pick up.**

Road signs will be put out at the entrances into town the week prior to the pick-up weekend.

- Leaves must be piled along the curbside --NOT extended back into the yard.
- Residents with limited frontage should consider putting piles at the end of their driveways.
- LEAVES ONLY--no compost, dirt, sticks, rocks, plant or garden material
- DO NOT place leaves on rock/gravel driveways or landscaping
- <u>LEAF PILES WILL NOT BE PICKED UP</u> <u>FROM PROPERTIES THAT DO NOT</u> <u>FOLLOW THESE CONDITIONS.</u>

A NOTE FROM THE CITY ADMINISTRATOR

With spring fast approaching, the Birchwood City Council is adopting a new policy for canoe and kayak storage at public easements that best serves all residents. Most importantly, canoes and kayaks not in use must be stored in racks, and must be properly licensed and registered with the City. Now all canoes and kayaks must have a permit displayed on their watercraft in the form of a sticker obtained at City Hall. The cost of the permit is \$10.00 and must be renewed annually. This allows the City to confirm that racks are being used by residents only. Additionally, there is a fee of \$25.00 for residents using racks without a permit, and a fee of \$50.00 for all watercraft that must be removed by the City due to lack of permit or failure to remove a canoe or kayak prior to October 31st.
