ROADS UPDATE, PLUS THE STOP SIGNS ARE WORKING!

The Roads Committee has been preparing for annual road maintenance to Cedar St/Hall Ave and Wildwood Ave. With the Spring crack sealing completed on all our streets, expect to see crews chip sealing these three roads early this summer.

We've also heard concerns about traffic volume and speeds along Wildwood and Cedar/Hall, which prompted us to solicit the help from the County Sheriff to place a radar speed trailer on each of those streets for a few days. These trailers also collect traffic data. It recorded just over 3000 vehicles on Cedar/Hall with an average speed of 27 mph during six days in April. It found 3% of cars traveled over 36 mph during that time period. Next, the trailer was moved to Wildwood Ave for four days and recorded just over 300 vehicles traveling at an average speed of 21 mph and 2% of vehicles were recorded traveling above 31 mph.

The Committee is always open to comments, ideas and your attendance at our meetings is always welcome! It meets the first Monday of each month at 6:30 in the Village Hall.

Now that the snow is melted and days are warmer and brighter, we Minnesotans are outdoors again. I enjoy working in my garden listening to birds and ducks returning to beautiful White Bear Lake. However, it seems on those beautiful warm days, neighbors and hired businesses are out using leaf blowers to clean not only their small yards but their driveways, docks, streets and decks, etc. The noise from them can be heard blocks away. Leaf blowers not only cause noise pollution, they blow dust and allergens and can contribute to hearing loss. WATER RATE INCREASE

The city bases its water rates on anticipated costs of service each year. The number of water main breaks we have per season is unpredictable. We budget for two each winter; this year we had three. The weather was especially hard on water pipes throughout the region due to the severely fluctuating temperatures transitioning through the freeze/thaw mark. As a result of these unanticipated costs, the water fund is in deficit. This requires the city to raise the water rates until the water fund is stable. Let's hope next season is much easier on our infrastructure.

CABLE COMMISSION POST OPEN

Shirley Donovan has resigned from the board for personal reasons. Shirley has served as our representative for the past two years and filled the large hole left when her husband Greg passed away. Shirley was a dedicated member of the commission and we will miss her greatly.

SUMMER 2017 SCHOOL DISTRICT BOUNDARY

Councilmembers Megan Malvey and Randy LaFoy request the help of community members who wish to do research regarding the potential for a school district alignment change for Birchwood from White Bear Lake (624) to Mahtomedi (832). Although the majority of Birchwood students still attend school in Mahtomedi (via open enrollment) the percentage is down from a few years ago, likely because fewer children are being accepted for open enrollment in Mahtomedi. Megan has received requests to pursue this from Birchwood parents whose children have been denied open enrollment to Mahtomedi or who have younger (pre-K) children who they hope will be able to attend school in Mahtomedi. It's worth noting that enrollment remains open in White Bear Lake, so students wishing to attend school in WBL would presumably have that opportunity even if a district alignment change occurred.

A district alignment change would not be an easy task with many approval steps involved. The first step, though, is to determine if the broader community of Birchwood supports pursuit of the change. In addition to considering the educational aspects of a change, it is also relevant to consider the impact on home values in Birchwood and taxes for all Birchwood residents if such a change were made. Megan and Randy plan to have a kick-off meeting in June with community members who are interested in helping do the research necessary to provide that type of information to the community. Meet Birchwood neighbor Ralph Ebbott! Ralph was born in 1927 in Edgerton Wisconsin. He was the youngest of five children. His Dad ran a farm implement store in town. At that time, Edgerton grew a lot of tobacco, and Ralph remembers the warehouses lining the street. He was grateful NOT to have to work there as a summer job, but he did work in a shoe factory. Ralph was very musical and received an oboe scholarship to attend the University of Wisconsin in Madison. He was a member of the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity. While at Madison, he met his wife-to-be, Elizabeth Adams from Solon, Iowa. Ralph was smitten. He ended up staying one more year in school, both to get his MBA and to make sure he could stay close to Liz.

Ralph and Liz lived on the East Coast for a time, but when they wanted to start a family they moved back to the Midwest. They first lived on Otter Lake Road in White Bear Lake, where they had four children. Ralph worked in the finance department for 3M for many years. At one point 3M sent him to Italy to help with a new acquisition and the whole family packed up and lived in Milan. After a year abroad, he and Liz returned to the US and bought their house in Birchwood. Liz loved how much room the yard had for flowers and vegetables. Ralph loved benefitting from Liz's green thumb. The Ebbott yard has been the site of a neighborhood Birchwood picnic for many years.

For most of their married life, Ralph & Liz travelled all over the world, including a memorable trip to New Guinea in the 80's. Sadly, Liz passed away in 1998, but Ralph holds her memory dearly.

Ralph has continued to travel without Liz, and was able to visit Cuba last year with two of his children plus spouses. Ralph enjoys opera, bridge, church, family visitors, crossword puzzles, and cuddle time with his great-granddaughter.

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MARIAN JOHNSON INDUCTED INTO GIRLS BASKETBALL HALL OF FAME

Our very own Marian Bemis Johnson of Birchwood was inducted into the Minnesota Girls Basketball Hall of Fame on April 8th at a ceremony at Carleton College in Northfield, Minnesota. Marian was honored for her many years of coaching women's basketball at Lakewood Community College, now Century College, and for her book, "Daughters of the Game" highlighting the story of girls' basketball in Minnesota, 1891-1942. The event was held in conjunction with the 2016-2017 Minnesota Girls All Star Games played at Carleton College that afternoon and featured 40 of the top players from across the State.

Marian's story-filled speech illustrated aspects of the history of Minnesota Girls Basketball. She investigated and unraveled the mystery of 'why' were there numerous, successful girls' teams before 1942 – and – none after that for the next four decades? Marian contacted people who had letters sent to school superintendents in the 1930's urging schools to drop girls basketball because a national organization said,

"it would be better for girls to play just for fun and to avoid the stress of competition, cheering crowds and coaches and fans pressuring them beyond the limits of the female psyche and limited physical staminal."

And the schools dropped the teams – for four decades!!.

Marian was honored as 'a courageous woman who left a legacy for female coaches, their schools and most important--the young women who are learning that they are important--that doors are open to them--and they can change the face of the world.'

Trivia

In the last newsletter it was noted that Marlys Oliver was the first woman mayor of Birchwood. Wrong. Lucy Tighe was. Her term was 1943-47. How progressive is that to have a woman at the helm 30 years before the 1970s Women's Movement? Thanks to Bill Trinka for this correction. "Aunt Lou" was Bill's great aunt. One more bit: Tighe-Schmitz Park was named for Lou and Clara Schmitz in the 1970s. Both dedicated themselves to Birchwood as volunteer servants for many years.

SEEKING INPUT ON OFF LEASH DOG AREA By Steve Schad

Last December, the Council formed a new "Dog Park Committee" to make a recommendation to them on where and how a dog park might be created in Birchwood. We've been talking to neighbors and conducting research, and we are now ready to bring the whole community into our conversation.

There has been some buzz about this effort, and knowing how sensitive public space usage can be, we committed early to having extensive public input. We also realized early that just the term "dog park" had to be addressed. One of the committee's first activities has been to clarify and reset the vision, because no one wants a large, industrial dog park like Stillwater's in our town.

So how might it be different? First, the committee established principles to shape the potential creation of an off-leash dog exercise area. These include the following.

- A fenced area that is unobtrusive with low visual impact
- Uses natural materials that complement the character of our community
- Is designed and placed to minimize impact on neighbors and other users
- Maximizes safety for people and pets

So, where? We looked at and debated every possible place, and we've decided to get further input on two concepts, following the principles above. Those are the wooded area behind city hall and an unused area of Bloomquist park.

The next step is to have a dialog as a community before recommending a single area for pilot to the council. We invite the town to join us to hear more about why we chose these areas over others, to see detailed mockups of what is being proposed, and to discuss the pros and cons.

We'll call the public meeting at some date after the July 4th holiday. We'll also issue an online survey at around the same time for public comment. We hope you join your neighbors in the dialogue.

6 BIRCHWOOD VILLAGE NEWS HELP STOP LAKE POLLUTION

The City of Birchwood Village asks your help to stop the discharge of illicit liquids and materials from entering the City's storm sewer system. Illicit discharges are generally any discharge not composed entirely of storm water; such as oil, paint, fertilizer, pet waste, car wash chemicals, and grass clippings. Storm sewer systems are not designed to handle anything other than storm water; everything dumped down the storm sewer eventually drains into lakes and streams. Illicit liquids and materials can kill important plants and animals and negatively impact the water quality.

Please take measures to keep the storm sewer system free from illicit discharge. If you see any unusual liquids or materials draining into a storm drain, ditch, stream, or lake, please call City Hall at 651-426-3403 or email info@cityofbirchwood.com. If it is after hours or on the weekend please call the Washington County Sheriff's department at 651-439-9381 or the 911 non-emergency hotline."

Enjoy a picnic snack and a glass of wine (City Council has approved consumption of beer and wine during the concerts) and sit back and enjoy the music. In case of inclement weather, the concert will be moved inside the Village Hall.

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MAYOR'S NOTES:

At its March meeting the city council approved fixing the remaining 10% of the city's sewer pipes. There were 4-5 small areas around town that have not been improved. Areas include parts of White Pine Lane, Birchwood Courts, Oakridge Drive and Birchwood Avenue/Jay Street areas. Residents affected will be getting a letter from the city.

These repairs extend the life of the sewer pipes for another 50-100 years. As one council member noted, "These is no reason why we wouldn't fix the problem now."

There were three previous sewer lining projects done in 2004, 2006 and 2008 which resulted in assessments between \$1000, \$1100 and \$1500 respectively. It is estimated this year's assessment will be just over \$600 per household. Ordinarily, one would anticipate this piecemeal approach 10 years later would result in significantly higher costs. A major reason for the large cost reduction now is engineering expenses will be 90% less than before.

The excessive costs in 2008 were a large reason why I got involved in city politics again. In researching how other cities go about sewer lining projects, not one approached such projects on an assessment basis—which adds much administrative overhead. Further, experts in the industry advise cities to do as big an area as possible to avoid the cost of re-staging the repair equipment. There is an economy of scale involved.

Finally, this is a time and material project that needs only a moderate investment in our engineer's time. I am happy that our current engineer is giving us guidance in a thorough, economical manner. As a result, the last group of residents that will be assessed will actually be paying the lowest rate compared to three other groups previously assessed. This cost savings benefit is the mission I started in 2009 and continue today. I am proud of that success.
