New City Backflow code: If you have an irrigation system, please make sure you have the proper backflow installed protecting the city public water supply. Our new code provides for assessing any costs incurred back to the property owner if you don't have one. Don't assume risks you don't have to.

Dog licenses are now **THREE YEARS**, retroactive to January 1. This coincides with rabies shot certificates. The fee is \$25 for a three year license.

Payment of your utility bill by ACH now earns you a \$3 credit each quarter. Look in your utility bill for FFI.

register your boat and obtain a permit sticker before selecting a spot on a rack. All boats must be registered or they will be removed. Registration is \$30/ boat.

# **MAYOR'S NOTES**

With the recent closing of Old Highway 244, the city was instantly inundated with vehicles ignoring stops signs, speeding well above the speed limit, and passing over the double yellow line. Many were seen using cell phones, which is just as dangerous as driving under the influence of alcohol. The frustrating part was no one from the state or county communicated any of these potential problems to our city-- our city was not supposed to be a detour for this project. And law enforcement was unable to protect us.

The city immediately reached out for help. We worked with our county commissioner, county sheriff and county public works department to address this chaos. The next day was our regularly-scheduled council meeting, and we brought all the principals to the table to discuss our options. From the start, the safety of our kids and residents was paramount. The council discussed its options for over an hour and concluded that this *defacto* detour for much of the highway traffic needed to be stopped. The council decided to coordinate with the county to stop through-traffic from using Hall/Cedar.

Understandably, there was push-back for accommodating those who needed to get their kids to and from Mahtomedi schools. The city council then held a special meeting a couple days later and agreed to limited openings between the hours of 7-9 am and 2:30-4:30 pm.

This is not a perfect solution, but the alternative of allowing trucks, tankers, and so many non-compliant drivers was an accident waiting to happen...and it did. One bicyclist was clipped and thrown from his bike. There were a couple of near-hits with children as well.

Our decision was not made lightly, but the city council has always erred on the side of safety. We will continue to review the situation and make adjustments where we can. In the meantime, please take care and exercise due caution on our roads. Have a safe summer. M
