

TEAMING UP FOR TRAFFIC SAFETY

Over the summer, the Sheriff's Office Special Investigations Unit and Special Enforcement Teams began "Teaming Up for Traffic Safety" using an enforcement model known as High Visibility Enforcement. HVE combines traditional traffic enforcement with high-visibility elements such as messaging boards or roadside signs, and a publicity strategy, including social media. Together these elements are designed to deter dangerous and unsafe drivers and to encourage voluntary compliance with traffic laws.

Between June and August, SIU/SET teams worked in several communities, including Marine on St. Croix, Mahtomedi, Stillwater Township, Baytown Township, Afton, Newport, Hugo and Mahtomedi. The numbers were impressive: In late June/early July, the teams made 61 traffic stops, resulting in 20 citations and 4 warrant arrests. In early August with a focus on distracted driving, they made 30 stops that resulted in 19 citations, included 15 for cell phone use, 3 for no seatbelts, 1 suspended license and 1 open container.

Now that school buses are back on our busy roads, it's even more important for drivers to pay attention to traffic laws, and enforcement will continue to be one of our top priorities. Stay safe!
