

WINTER DRIVING SAFETY

While we may wish for a winter wonderland for the holidays, the inevitable appearance of snow and ice on our roads means we'll need to reacquaint ourselves with driving in these seasonal conditions. Here are some reminders, thanks to the Minnesota Department of Transportation.

- Don't drive distracted. This applies to all seasons!
- Slow down to a safe speed for current conditions.
- Turn on your headlights, wear your seat belt and turn off the cruise control.
- Stay alert for snowplows, which turn or exit frequently and may travel over centerlines or partially in traffic to further improve road conditions.
- Stay back at least 10 car lengths behind snowplows. Don't drive into a snow cloud.
- Be patient and remember snowplows are working to improve road conditions for your trip.

Also, be sure to check with your community about winter parking restrictions, which generally prohibit parking on designated streets from October through May. No matter the weather, Washington County deputies will be out on your roads, helping to keep our communities safe.

At 6:40pm on Nov. 1, a deputy spoke with a Birchwood resident reporting the theft of a double-headed ax at a repair shop in Grant. The caller had dropped it off for sharpening, but upon returning to pick it up in the communal pick-up spot at the business, it wasn't there. The business had contacted the caller a week prior to say the ax, estimated to be valued at \$20, would be waiting in the pick-up spot, but the caller wasn't able to get there until Nov. 1. There are no cameras at the pick-up location and no known suspects. The caller understood the likelihood of recovery was low but wanted it documented.
